# A WORD FROM PASTOR TIM

# Life Fully Lived

Don't waste your time on useless work, mere busywork, the barren pursuits of darkness. Expose these things for the sham they are. It's a scandal when people waste their lives on things they must do in the darkness where no one will see. Rip the cover off those frauds and see how attractive they look in the light of Christ. "Wake up from your sleep, Climb out of your coffins; Christ will show you the light! So watch your step. Use your head. Make the most of every chance you get. These are desperate times! Don't live carelessly, unthinkingly. Make sure you understand what the Master wants. (Ephesians 5:11-17 The Message)

Do you ever get distracted from accomplishing a task? I know that I do. I am easily distracted. My wife will give me a task to accomplish and I will meander my way to getting it done by doing several other (what I think are) "important" tasks. I get distracted from my purpose.

In this passage from Paul's letter to the Ephesians, Paul calls us to live life with purpose. He tells not to "waste our time...[or] waste our lives on things you just do in the darkness...[or] live carelessly, unthinkingly."

Instead, says the apostle, we should "watch our step, use our head, make the most of every chance we get...[and] make sure we understand what the Lord wants."

Our "time" is an opportunity to join the purposes of God in the world. When we get "distracted" we may miss the important thing that God wants us to do.

Now that doesn't mean that every moment of everyday is intently focused on a task. Sometime God wants us to be still, to meander, to dream. Other times He wants us to focus on a relationship that is in front of us because we "don't want to live carelessly, unthinkingly." We want to make sure that we "understand what the Master wants."

So as the hot days of summer continue into August and September, remember to live your life fully, with God's purposes in mind.

#### A LITTLE HISTORY ABOUT EAT & GREET...

While going over ideas for helping our community, it became apparent that we needed an outreach for our low income families to provide a meal at the end of each month. Three LCPC members, Becca Leavitt, Roberta Price, and Suzy Smith started getting together and began researching how, when, and who the person or persons we needed to talk with at our church, about getting an outreach off the ground. Everyone was excited to try and make this ministry work, and after some prayerful consideration, we came up with the name, Eat and Greet.

In the beginning it was just a good meal and some friendly talk, getting to know our neighbors at Lakeside Gardens, and others in our church community. Some of our guests suggested playing Bingo, and we looked into it to see if we could offer prizes for winning. However, we found out that we could not give out prizes because it was considered gambling, so we came up with opportunity tickets, which were handed out to each guest upon their arrival.

Sadly, we lost Becca and Roberta to other churches in our community. They were and are still sorely missed. Later, we added bragging certificates, for the two tables of prizes. The gifts are small items that our congregations graciously donated. Through Sheila King's outstanding research and grant writing, we received a grant to help us with our costs, and we were able to provide free pantry bags for our guests.

Because of our cooks, Joanne Laird and Gary MacDonald, and with the help of Ski Zenski, Suzy Smith, Michael McKnight, Wendy MacDonald and others, we are continuing to make Eat and Greet a great success! *Thank you for your support as we reach out to our community.*

#### BOOK REVIEW BY SHEILA KING – UNBROKEN BY LAURA HILLENBRAND

During a discussion with Pastor Tim, I discussed the geography refresher course I had as a result of our mission's wood puzzle map in the Fireside Room. I told him the locations of the islands in the South Pacific made me recall studying the fighting that took place during WWII. This prompted Pastor Tim to ask if I had read, Unbroken by Laura Hillenbrand, I hadn't. He lent me the book. It's the story of Louis Zamperini who was an Olympian runner in 1936 and later as an airman in WWII who survived a plane crash, 47 days adrift at sea, starvation and beatings at multiple Japanese prison camps.

More importantly, the story is about God's never-failing grace and redemption. By all accounts Louis Zamperini was a scrappy youth with a short temper, stealing, a very strong will, and fast. Just as God prepares us for things to come, Louis' strong will, grit and determination prepared him for the horrors he was going to experience and unbeknownst to him God was always with Louis.

Like so many soldiers throughout history, war leaves scars that cannot be seen, today we call it Post Traumatic Syndrome Disorder (PTSD) and Louis sunk into alcoholism upon his return to civilian life. After multiple requests by his wife to attend one of Billy Graham's Crusades in Los Angeles, Louis attended and initially walked out, but unrelenting pleading by his wife, Louis sat through another of Billy Graham's sermons and then it clicked for Louis. He recalled the time in the raft adrift in the Pacific, his body wasting away, dying of thirst that he had prayed to God that if He saved him, Louis would serve God for forever. How often do we pray to God to save us from a situation and then ignore Him after the situation has passed?

Something within Louis shifted, I believe it was the Holy Spirit taking hold. Louis immediately was a changed man; he quit drinking, forgave his cruel captors, his PTSD nightmares ended, and he dedicated his life to Christ. Louis found peace, at the foot of the cross. From the moment Louis Zamperini accepted the grace God offered, he was filled with the Holy Spirit, dedicating his new life to Christ, starting the nonprofit Victory Boys Camp, speaking to audiences of redemption through Christ, and while in his eighties worked at First Presbyterian Church of Hollywood.

The book is not new, it was #1 New York Times Bestseller in 2010, but is worth reading. The author took seven years to research and write Louis' story, but the book is a very easy read. The author also wrote Seabiscuit. The famous story of the racehorse during the depression. If you enjoy reading about adventure, true stories, history, resilience and redemption then Unbroken is a must read; and if you are not a reader the book was made into a movie. 9

# FIRESIDE ROOM & PASTOR'S OFFICE

#### PHASE 1

A "new" gathering spot, The Fireside Room, and relocation of the Pastor's office was completed July 10th, though an early preview rolled out on Sunday July 9 during Fellowship Time. The response was very favorable and I received several very good suggestions for further improvements. As such I will immediately purchase some type of sliding door threshold ramp to minimize a potential tripping hazard. The large desk and two drawer file cabinet, currently in the Fireside room will be removed and are available for purchase, if anyone is interested please submit an offer into the office.

The cost for the Fireside Room and Pastor's Office was done at no cost to the church's 2023 approved budget. A thank you to the Prayer Quilt Ministry for their generosity of \$1,000 and the balance by Kevin and Sheila King in memory of Sheila's mom, Dorothy Zenski, and belated wife of Ski Zenski.

The proposed plan for the Fireside Room included a cost estimate that was submitted and approved June 20 by the Property & Stewardship committee and subsequently approved June 27 by Session, and completed July 10; less than 2 weeks from the date Session approved! How did this happen so quickly? A detailed plan, including costs, budget and timeline was submitted to the committee. A single focal person coordinated the team of volunteers who offered their time, and a daily review of the project timeline was followed and communicated. Not all church work can be accomplished within this type of speed, but with prayer, a plan and volunteers we can accomplish much.

#### PHASE 2

This is in the preliminary stage and will require funding. This phase includes: a wall mounted (swivel & extends) TV in the Fireside room to support Bible Studies and other small group studies, add electric in the wall with the TV, new window treatments, a new narrow table with shelves for literature for the front office, refinish the kitchenette cabinets and repair the long overhead kitchenette cabinet, replace sliding door locks (Fireside Room and small kitchen). If you have additional ideas that are non-construction for the Fireside Room and little kitchen please submit to Sheila King.

A few of our long-time congregation members reminisced about the two remodel rooms. As it turns out the original location of the Pastor's office is where Pastor Tim has relocated his office and the room we have named The Fireside Room, was originally called the Fireside Room and used for small groups, meetings, etc. Unbeknownst to many of us, we have come full circle and restored the original use of the two rooms

#### **MISSIONARY FIELD - CHYNOWETH FAMILY AND MINISTRY UPDATE**

#### Dear Friends,

This update is overdue. A lot has happened since I last wrote in March. Let me catch you up on both the family and ministry fronts:

Family: Cynthia was diagnosed with Chronic Lymphocytic Leukemia (CLL) several years ago. Her oncologist has been monitoring it regularly. Recently due to enlarged lymph nodes, she began long term immunotherapy (chemotherapy) with a daily tablet. Her lymph nodes have since shrunk so it seems the medication is working well. Please pray for her as she will be using the medication indefinitely. A very special blessing in this was the medication costs have been paid for 100% with no cost to us (The announced cost initially was \$20,000/month!!! with 80% covered by our Medicare insurance).

Jim, Jessie and their 3 children are doing well in Cyprus though Jackson had surgery after breaking his arm in a bicycle accident. It has healed but likely will require surgery in a few months to remove a plate that was put in. We are planning a visit to see them in October combined with a 10th anniversary trip to Italy. They have one more year in Cyprus and Jim is in the process of "bidding" (as the Dept. of State calls it) for his next assignment for the fall of 2024.

Mike and Michelle just celebrated their 20th anniversary! Mike is now busy pursuing a new job since his technology company went through a major retrenchment as a result of financial issues at the company. Also, grandson, Michael, has a broken toe and some cuts, scrapes and bruises from a collision with a car while out training for cross-country track. He's healing fine but won't be running soon.

Ministry: The last time, I wrote, I was coaching two leaders (One in Uganda and an American based in Europe) and that went very well. In May I helped take one of the teams working with Cru's humanitarian Aid ministry through a team building training. Their feedback was that it really helped them as they seek to work together more effectively toward their team's contribution to the Great Commission.

More recently, I was asked to meet with the leaders of another mission organization, Leadership Development and Human Resources (LDHR), on the topic of developing their Member Care services (as part of the Human Resources for their organization). It was a real privilege to learn more about their ministry and how it has grown from a small mission organization to more than 350 staff from more than 10 countries in the past ten years. One of the resources I was able to share with them is our Cru HR

website. It is open for anyone interested to use: LDHR.org. Pray for this couple as they develop the member care resources for their mission agency in Eastern Europe. I recently was asked to help contribute to the design of an orientation for new global level leaders within Cru. I led our Global Leader Orientation from 2012-2019. When we reorganized our global leadership two years ago, we decentralized and now our senior leaders live all over the world rather than all being located here in Orlando. The result is we need to explore how to orient new leaders at a distance using the internet, etc. Pray for wisdom as this project will be unfolding over the next several months.

Friends, I am so grateful for each of you and your encouragement. The Lord continues to be so incredibly good and gracious to us! Thanks for praying and patiently getting through this long update!
